
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
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# The Herder & Herder publishing program features the research and writing of Bernard McGinn



We are particularly proud to be the publisher of the scholarship of Bernard McGinn, Dr. McGinn is one is of the greatest living authorities on Catholic historical theology. The Naomi Shenstone Donnelly Professor (Emeritus) of historical theology and history of Christianity at the University of Chicago, McGinn holds a Ph.D. from Brandeis University and an S.T.L. from the Pontifical Gregorian University. He has lectured on and written extensively about the history of apocalyptic thought, and for the last several decades has focused

his attention on the fields of spirituality and mysticism. His focus on the latter topic has garnered international attention from the academic community, which acknowledges his work as the top in its field.

He is a Fellow of the Medieval Academy of America and of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences. He is married to Patricia Ferris McGinn, a licensed professional counselor, with whom he collaborated in writing *Early Christian Mystics: The Divine Vision of the Spiritual Masters* (Crossroad, 2003). He is enjoying a fruitful retirement, continuing to research and write volumes for the critically-acclaimed **The Presence of God: A History of Western Christian Mysticism** series.



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
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
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
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
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
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
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
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
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
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
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
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
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
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
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
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
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
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

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
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
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
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y Life in Dialogue begins with the author's spiritual journey leading to the practice of Zen, and then to the Catholic Church. This journey was guided by mystical experiences that brought him to his vocation in interreligious dialogue, and by two dark nights (about which he wrote in his recent book, My Dark Nights) that enabled him to carry out that vocation. In 1986, he was selected to be an advisor on dialogue with Buddhism by the

Pontifical Council for Interreligious Dialogue (PCID). He shares in-depth details about the events of the first three dialogues under Pope John Paul II. He also gives the reader an understanding of Pope Francis's new dialogue of fraternity, in which Mitchell was a facilitator for the PCID. The author describes how this new dialogue of brothers and sisters led to addressing social issues in the cities of the participants, including housing for the homeless Brooklyn, Chicago, and Los Angeles. He also shares his experience in dialogue with Islam that, after 9/11, involved projects with Muslim leaders in Central Asia, the Middle East, North Africa, the Philippines and Thailand. The program in the Philippines contributed to the signing of a peace agreement between the government and the Moro Islamic Liberation Front (MILF).



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
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
